Also thanks to Ken Writz for watching over and caring for the range. We have something to be proud of and everyone worked together to make this happen.

As Dwight reported, we are getting another new plow truck. For years we had older trucks and Frank spent a good amount of time and money keeping them going. With careful planning and a wise use of your tax dollars, a few years ago, we were able to purchase our first new plow truck and now we are able to purchase another. We now will have two new large plow trucks.

We can be very proud of our streets. I know that occasionally we have some rough spots, but we get them patched and maintained as best we can with the dollars we have. We have a schedule we try to use to re-do each street. We have almost completely gone through the gamut and hopefully will be able to just do a resurface instead of a complete rebuild. This will be a substantial cost savings once we get to that point and hopefully we will be able to do a little more each year because of that. All in all, I think our streets are in better shape than most of the surrounding communities.


**WATER & SEWER COMMITTEE**

The Village has contracted with Visu-Sewer to use Cured-in-place pipe (CIPP) for 1,196 LF of sewer main running from Hwy 97 S (Behind the Athens Cenex Store) to Allen St. (Near the old train depot) This process rehabilitates pipe by installing a new fully structural cured-in-place pipe inside the host pipe from above ground. The new pipe “inside the old pipe” will provide maximum strength and flow capacity without the need for costly digging.

Sewers fail due to various defects. Elimination of these defects will extend the sewer life without costly excavation. The CIPP process: The resin-impregnated liner is inverted into the host pipe using water or air to hold the liner tight against the host pipe, until it is heat-cured, converting it into a strong, new pipe.



After the new pipe has cured, services are reconnected by a remote-controlled robotic cutter.



The evening of 9/24/2016 we encountered a lightning strike to the booster station/ground storage reservoir. A variety of items were damaged and repaired or replaced including the main transformer, fluoride pump motor, Chlorine/Caustic pump motor, Chemical feed control box (controls flow rate pumps), Dehumidifier, and Transformer and circuit board for the Modine heater. The work was done by Martin Weise, Caleb Bahler (Genesis) and LW Allen.

The Village will replace about 800 ft. of water main and add more shut off valves on West Village Limits road in 2017. We have had several costly water main repairs in this section over the past several years. We will be completing the replacement 1 year ahead of the repaving the street.

Our water loss reported to the DNR for the last quarter was at 15%.

The Village Water & Sewer Department needs help from our residents to solve our clear water inflow problems and we are asking all residents to PLEASE check and make sure your sump pump, eave troughs, or any other source of clear water isn't entering the sanitary sewer system.

**FIRE & POLICE COMMITTEE**

The Police and Fire committee is happy to report that it has been relatively quiet around here. The Athens World Fair is over and school is back in session. There are a couple of things to report on though.

Fire Commission: The Fire Department is in the planning stages to replace one of their main engines. Chief Lavicka is gathering information from vendors and fireman and will present some options to the December and March Fire Commission meetings. The new ambulance continues to work great and is certainly getting used. Fire and EMS had multiple mock accident scenarios in early October. Some involved surrounding services and the Aspirus MedEvac Helicopter. Our Fire and EMS strives to stay current and well trained to face many different scenarios.

Police: The Police Dept. continues to utilize a great pool of part time officers. They help fill in the gaps when Chief Stencil can't be around. The Police and Fire Committee has put forth a recommendation to the board to either hire an additional second officer and/or increase the pay scale for these officers to \$18/hr to keep pace with area agencies. Our current pay scale for these brave individuals is \$12-13.50/hr. This leads to people looking at other opportunities to help provide for themselves and their families. This decision will be made as part of the budget process.

Chief Stencil was able to obtain a grant that allowed us to upgrade the camera in the squad. Other than a couple other maintenance items and updates with communications equipment in the squad, there is not much more to report.

We love our small town and hope you continue to support our Fire, EMS and Police!

**STREET COMMITTEE**

It's been a busy year for the Street Committee. In January and February, the Village applied for 2 grants for the Mount View Lane Reconstruction project from Hwy 97 to Pioneer Road. We applied for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for \$340,000 and the Transportation Economic Assistance (TEA) for \$500,000. These dollar amounts were based on new jobs created and retained by Janke General Contractors and Black Rock Ready Mix. We received CDBG funding for the full amount, but were informed that the maximum amount of TEA Grant funding we would be eligible for was only \$85,000 due to their grant funding criteria. We decided not to proceed with the TEA Grant as it was not worth the extra project costs associated with it. We are going forward with the Mount View Lane project in 2017. Bidding will be in January and construction complete by the end of August.

We completed the reconstruction of Duenow and Schlegel Streets in June and July. The contractor completed the project 2-3 weeks ahead of schedule. New curb & gutter, sidewalk, storm sewer and blacktop were included in this project. Work was done by all contractors showing that we have talented workers in the Athens area.

As many of you are aware, Athenian Properties is constructing an Assisted Living Facility in Athens on Caroline Street. Currently, Caroline Street only extends 1 block south of Jensen Street, which means that we will need to construct an extension of 600 feet. The project will start at Jensen Street and proceed south 1,000 lineal feet. Curb & gutter, sidewalk, storm sewer and blacktop are parts of this project. This project will be funded by TID #2 tax dollars. The Village was able to create a Developer's Agreement with Athenian Properties that is a win-win situation for both parties.

Crack sealing was completed in September. We are doing more of this to keep our good streets in good shape.


The Committee worked hard and diligent to get an ATV/UTV route open in the Village for residents of the Village and surrounding area. Since opening in June, there have been very few problems. With all 4 surrounding townships open to ATV use, we currently have access to the east and south townships. We are

working on a potential route west of Athens to the other 2 townships.


It is going to be a busy 2017 for the Street Committee with 2 major street projects (Mount View Lane and Caroline Street). The tentative plan is to do West Village Limits Road (from Mueller St to Plisch St) and Caroline Street (from Mueller St to Kreutzer St) in 2018

**PARKS & PUBLIC WELFARE**



As 2016 comes to a close, the shooting range improvement project does as well. The grant funding the village received for the project needs to be completed and closed by year end. With that said we are happy to have the range open and completed with the exception of a couple miscellaneous items. A small storage shed will be added yet, security cameras and electric service if weather permits.



With the help of the Athens Area Trail Association, we were able to replace a walking bridge in Erbach Park along with many other trail improvements. In Athens Park, a walking bridge was also replaced and steps were added on the berm leading to trails at the corner entrance near the Fritz Redmann storage units. Funding for the steps was donated by BA & Esther Greenheck, Athens VFW and Athens American Legion. Thanks to Steve Brewster, Dee Brewster, Glen Luetschwager and Peter Barbella for building and installing them.

Thank you to our village employees also for their work on the walking bridge and park improvements as well as the shooting range.

The timber harvest bid was awarded to Thurs Logging and should begin in the winter/spring of 2017 weather permitting. The select cutting will take place mainly in the north and west areas of the village forest. There will also be some select cutting in Athens Park. The harvest project is needed to properly manage these

areas. Better growth, esthetics and safety are priority. Please be aware of this project if you utilize these trails during this time.

**PUBLIC PROPERTY COMMITTEE**

As the year winds down, I can report that all of the 2016 Public Property budgeted projects have been completed. The initial purchase was a line striper for painting parking spaces and crosswalk lines. The new sprayer also has a length of hose and numerous spray tips which will allow for painting large areas such as walls or fences. The village shop received a new enlarged shop door allowing for easier entry and exit for village equipment. Aaron's offices were refreshed with paint and carpet and the boardroom was also recarpeted. New floor tile was installed in the Community Hall upstairs bathroom as well as some new fixtures. A little finish works remains for that project. Lastly, we were able to purchase two used scoreboards from the Athens School District for the Community Hall. The boards have not been installed yet but will be hooked up as soon as sports schedules allow.

Now for the 2017 budget. A new plow truck will top the upcoming budget. Due to the cost of the truck replacement, there will only be a few small items for the remaining budget. A metal band saw is needed for the shop to replace a worn out chop saw. Some concrete barriers will be budgeted to develop a containment area for the village's stockpiles of granite and black dirt. Finally, the heavy amount of foot traffic into the clerk's office for the purpose of paying utility bills, tax bills and the delivery of treats for the clerk, has necessitated the replacement of that carpet.

On the repair front, the back exterior wall on the library had some leaking issues this summer during the heavy rains. Some of the blocks were found to be deteriorated and those blocks have been fixed as well as some mortar joints that needed to be sealed. The committee will be looking into refurbishing the bowling lanes in the 11<sup>th</sup> Frame if financially possible. Funds for that will come from a separate account derived from bowling fees and rent.

**VILLAGE OF ATHENS WINTER  
PARKING REGULATIONS**

No person shall park any vehicle on any public street or highway in the Village of Athens between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m., Monday through Friday, and from 2:30 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday, from November 1<sup>st</sup> through April 1<sup>st</sup> inclusive, except under circumstances described in Sec. 346.50, Wis. Stats., and on New Year's Day when there shall be no restrictions.

**Construction – Remodeling – Repair**

All parties doing any major work to houses, garages, etc., are required to contract with a supplier for a dumpster to put your debris in. This is your cost or the cost of the contractor. **NO DEBRIS IS ALLOWED AT THE DISPOSAL SITE, VILLAGE GARAGE, OR ANYONE PARK DUMPSTERS!!!** The dumpster at the Village Garage Site is there for use by Veolia Waste Services when Village residents call for the dumpster service. They are not the Villages and are not there for public use!! For service call **1-888-271-7176**.

**VILLAGE OF ATHENS SNOW & ICE REMOVAL POLICY**

Within 24 hours after the cessation of any fall of sleet or snow, it shall be the duty of the owners and/or the occupants of any lot or parcel of land to remove the snow or sleet from any and all sidewalks adjacent to the premises of such owner or occupant, and to keep the same free and clear of snow and ice for the **FULL** width of the sidewalk. If the owner/occupant fails to remove the snow or sleet (ice) from the sidewalks, Village employees shall remove the snow/ice and assess a fee of **\$75/hr with minimum charge of \$75** against the owner for the cost of removing the ice/snow.

**Attention Dog Owners**

**Wisconsin State Law Requires All** dogs to be vaccinated against rabies and to be licensed. Property owners may pay for dog license when paying property taxes or in Village Clerk's Office. Licenses will be issued after the fee and proof that the dog has been vaccinated has been furnished.

**RATES For Dog Licenses Are:**

- Neutered/Spayed Dogs.....\$ 5.00
- Males/Females ..... 10.00
- Puppy M or F .....\$2.50 or 5.00
- Kennel License ..... 50.00

A list of delinquent dog owners will be sent to the District Attorney's office on April 1, 2017. Fines of \$50 to \$100 may be imposed for unvaccinated dogs.

**BUILDING PERMITS**

Anyone planning on building a new house or structure, remodeling or doing alterations to existing buildings in the Village of Athens, shall apply for a permit from Ben Brooks, (257-7183) to obtain such a permit. No work should proceed until the permit has been issued. No permit is required for construction or repair work with a value of \$1,000 or less. Remember, this dollar figure is based on material and labor costs. Even if you do your own labor, you must include at least a minimum labor cost along with the material cost for permit purposes. Permits are good for 6 months, and projects not having permits displayed for public view, or without permits, can be halted by the inspector or the Police Department.

**Snowmobile Trail Access**

As in the past, residents will be allowed to travel the roads and alleys to and from their houses, using the most direct route to the trail. The speed limit will be 10 mph and the snowmobiles must yield the right-of-way to other vehicles using the streets and alleys. Snowmobiles are prohibited from traveling on STH 97 (Pine St., Mueller St., and Alfred St.); however, snowmobiles are allowed to cross the highway. It should be noted that access to the trails does not apply to ATVs and ATVs will not be allowed to travel the roads and alleys.

Please realize it only takes one problem snowmobile rider to ruin this privilege for the residents. Therefore, it is important that if you see violations/abuse of this privilege, that you collect what information you can and report it to the Athens Police Department.

**\*\*\*HUNTING ORDINANCE\*\*\***

**No hunting of any kind (INCLUDING PURSUING, DRIVING OR CHASING ANIMALS) shall be allowed on Village owned property.**

## GARBAGE & RECYCLING INFORMATION

Curbside garbage and recycling pickup is weekly on Friday. All items are to be placed at the curb by 6 a.m. and are not allowed out any sooner than 24 hours prior to pickup, and containers are to be removed from the curb within 24 hours after pickup. Residents are allowed to place (2) 30 gallon trash bags or two (2) reusable containers, not to exceed a loaded weight of 50 lbs. each. If you have more than allowed, the contractor is not to pick the additional up and is supposed to tag it as such. You can put out any quantity of recyclables each week. **NO LIMIT!!**

The following items can be mixed together:

1. **ALUMINUM CANS/CONTAINER GLASS** (glass clean with caps removed and should not be broken), **PLASTIC BOTTLES & CONTAINERS** (#1 through #7 clean bottles/containers including aseptic packaging such as juice boxes and soup broth containers, but DOES NOT include motor oil bottles, plastic bags, styrofoam cups/containers and packing peanuts), and **TIN CANS** (clean with labels removed) can be mixed together in one container.
2. **MIXED PAPER PRODUCTS:** Includes all grades of paper including newspapers, magazines, phone books, file folders, post-it notes, spiral notebooks, cereal boxes, shoe boxes, grocery bags, beverage cartons. Can include paper clips and staples but DOES NOT include wax paper, hand towels, napkins or paper plates. \*All paper products should be placed in a paper bag or bundled\*
3. **CORRUGATED CARDBOARD:** Must be flattened and bundled in bundles not more than 12 inches high by 24 inches wide and 36 inches long. DOES NOT include waxed cardboard.
4. Waste oil – there is a drop off site located at the recycling center by the Disposal Plant on Goodrich Street. PLEASE make sure to take your containers with you.
5. Yard Waste (leaves, grass clippings, yard/garden debris)- The Village has a drop off site located at 104 Degner St. When bringing items to this site, please put them in the proper place as noted by the signs!
6. Large items excluding appliances and console tvs (such as couches & recliners) - Please call Advanced Disposal at 1-888-271-7176 to schedule a pickup.
7. Tire Recycling- Please call either Len's Auto (257-9186) or Gauerke's Tire and Auto (257-7808) for the cost.




